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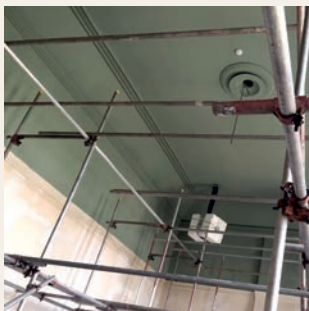
Founders Dinner

The Auriol Room

Coming soon to the Clifton Club: a quiet space for work and study.

Members will know of this year's project to reopen and refurbish the space 'behind the Greenway room' on the second floor of the Club. This space will be known as the Auriol Room, making reference to the individual who first proposed the building of the Assembly Rooms in Clifton. (There is much more on John Auriol in this issue's 'From the Vault').

The Auriol Room will provide a completely new facility, open to all Members and aimed especially at those who need a calm space to work or study. There will be good access to WiFi and plenty of power points for laptop users. We think of it as the Clifton Club's

answer to the Quiet Carriage on GWR – however without the ban on telephone calls! We don't see it as a meeting room, as we would like to allow Members to be able to drop in whenever they like. However we will monitor the room's use during 2018, and keep an open mind on additional purposes: it is quite a 'grand' room with a high quality wooden floor and so could lend itself to a wider range of activities.

The project is almost at an end, and we can expect to see the room in its finished state by the middle of December (although we may need a bit more time to set it up for Members' use). This is a significant moment in the Club's recent history: bringing the last of our large rooms back into service for the benefit of its Members, in time for the Club's bicentenary year. **By Chris Day.**

John Lewis Auriol and the Clifton Assembly Rooms

I have previously written of John Lewis Auriol, but as we come to name our newly renovated public room, it is appropriate to revisit his life.

Auriol was born in Lisbon in 1755 – the year of the great earthquake and fire. His father James had left France for England via Switzerland following the Huguenot purges of the Seventeenth Century and in 1739 was naturalised by an Act of Parliament. James joined his uncle's merchant company in Lisbon and in 1752 married Charlotte Russell the daughter of the British Consul. Their three sons James, Charles and our John Lewis were educated in England before joining the East India Company in Bengal.

John Lewis Auriol remained in Bengal until 1803 and, having made a modest fortune, retired and returned to England, settling in Clifton in 1804. He purchased a small manor in the village of Wick Wick, near Frenchay. The manor house today is the 'Willy Wicket' pub and restaurant. Auriol also purchased a number of houses in Royal York Crescent which may have brought him into contact with Francis Greenway, who was then completing houses in Cornwallis Crescent.

In December 1804, following the Jane Austen edict 'that a single man in possession of a good fortune, must be in want of a wife', Auriol married a young widow Anna Whyte: Auriol was 49 and Anna 27. A marriage settlement of £20,000 of 3% consols was agreed.

Auriol and Greenway commenced plans for the construction of a Hotel complex in Clifton. At that time Hotwells was the centre of social activity but despite the economic disruptions created by the ongoing war with France, housing development was gradually creeping up the steep slopes towards Clifton. Hotwells was also being affected by the creation of the Floating Harbour, and the move of the resort to Clifton was perhaps only a matter of time.

In March 1806, Auriol purchased land on the Mall, and together with Greenway covenanted to construct buildings to be used either as rooms of public resort or as seven dwelling houses. If Auriol had constructed houses, the top end of the Mall would probably have been enclosed to form a housing square. The decision had yet to be made when Auriol addressed a meeting of the nobility and gentry at the Sion Hill Pump Room with his proposal for building a new Assembly Room, offering either the Mall site or an alternative on Sion Hill. The Mall site was approved and within six weeks the foundations were being laid.

Three years later, the exterior of the Assembly Rooms was almost complete, but Francis Greenway and his brothers were in financial strife. Auriol filed a suit for bankruptcy against him, and a week later the Hotel and Assembly Rooms were advertised either for sale or to let. Within three months the Bristol Mirror advised that Auriol had now 'given his consent to convert the centre part of that beautiful building into a Chapel,

which will be one of the most elegant and extensive in England, capable of containing nearly 1000 persons, including about 200 poor, who are to be allowed admission gratis'. This never came to fruition although Auriol later chaired a number of meetings to raise subscriptions for a chapel in Clifton.

Work continued under the guidance of another architect – a Mr Kay of London. In April 1811 the Clifton Hotel opened, with William Mangeon the hotelkeeper. The venture was not financially sound; in 1808, Auriol had had to sell the Manor of Wick Wick (perhaps to William Wilberforce, the slave abolitionist) and in 1811 he redeemed the 3% consols from his marriage settlement at a considerable loss and soon after borrowed a further £5000 from his sister Sophia (married to John Prinsep). When Auriol died in 1839, the mortgages were outstanding and unable to be discharged. When Anna Auriol asked for her marriage settlement, Auriol's estate was placed into the hands of the High Court of Chancery where it was to remain for the next 16 years.

John Lewis Auriol is one of the unrecognised characters in the development of Clifton. His initiative to build the Hotel and Assembly Rooms wrested control of the resort away from the Hotwells and today gives Clifton its most historically significant and majestic building. From its completion in 1811 until the Victoria Rooms opened in 1842, the Hotel and Assembly Rooms were the centre of Clifton's social activity and, today, his legacy remains resplendent, a convivial centre of social activity for the successors of the Nobility and Gentry that frequented the watering place resorts of Clifton and Hotwells.
